FEAR

When [Satan] lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies. John 8: 44c

Satan is a liar and one of his favorite and most powerful lies is when he speaks fear into our life. I'm not sure who said it first but I've heard it said that the letters in fear stand for: False Evidence Appearing Real. For example: I grew up during the 70's which was a decade full of talk about the prospect of nuclear war. People were building bomb shelters and stock piling food in order to survive a nuclear attack. I remember asking my parents if we shouldn't be doing the same thing. They told me that the world would be such an awful place after a nuclear attack that it wouldn't be worth surviving. They followed up by also telling me that if you read the Bible and believe the Bible; you will realize that there is not going to be a nuclear war

Over time I have learned to listen for the voice of the Holy Spirit to guide me in my life. One of the most important things to remember about the voice of the Holy Spirit is that God's voice will never speak fear to you. God's voice might warn you but His voice will never cause you to fear. If you are listening to a voice that is telling you to be afraid; you can be sure that it is not the voice of God.

The word of God tells us at, II Timothy 1:7, "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind." While it's good to be concerned enough about your future to make wise choices today, don't let your concern turn into worry or fear. Trust God that no matter what happens, He will take care of you. Even if you have made mistakes and wrong decisions, He is merciful and will sustain you and will use those mistakes for something good. Trust God completely and He will give you peace and clarity. Let me leave you with one more Bible verse to apply to your life from Proverbs 3: 5-6, Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

Trustees Update

Here are the updates on the latest Trustee Projects.

We are still in the process of working with the insurance company of the damage to the soffit at the Parsonage during a March wind storm. We are also working on the water issues along part of the west and north basement walls while the Parsonage is empty between families.

The electricity is now on for the new video screen on the back wall of the Sanctuary. Now we'll work on getting Traviss Audio Visual in to help us mount the screen and run the video cable to it. The new large screen will help the Pastor and other speakers when sharing the Word or other announcements.

There are several other projects that we are aware of and they include:

- The flushing issue with the women's restroom in the lobby.
- Repair or replacement of the ceiling in the Education office.
- Electrical repairs in the original basement and some possible foundation work along the west wall of the kitchen.
- Replacing the roof on the three-bay garage.
- Soffit repair on the NE side of the church.

All of these are on hold until the church finances are in better shape.

Food Pantry

The Pantry dates for June are: Saturday, June 14th and Saturday, June 28th. The Food Pantry is open from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on each of those days.

The need for assistance with food is a growing problem for April the numbers were:

Families: 59 People: 184

Food In: 1,519 pounds Food Out: 1,095 pounds

Personal In: 15 Personal Out: 29

The Pantry could use the following items:

- Canned Soup
- Hamburger/Chicken/Tuna Helper
- Oatmeal
- Farina/Cream of Wheat
- Pancake Mix
- Cookies or baking mixes

Remember that the pounds of food coming in and going out does not include dairy items, meat items, eggs, or bakery items. The personal items are things like shampoo, toilet paper, tooth paste/tooth brushes, and laundry soap.

Thank you for your support of this program. While we are small in size, we are making a very large impact in the lives of the people we serve.

UWFaith News (A.K.A) Petticoat Patter

It is late May and I'm thinking about getting flowers put on the graves of my loved ones who passed away. During the Memorial Day weekend it is traditional for a few of us in the family (myself, my sister, my niece and my great-niece) to perform this duty.

Of course, being curious I had to see if my memory on the history of Memorial Day was correct. Did you know that it started in the south shortly after the Civil War? The name of the celebration started out as "the day to memorialize the glorious dead." Glad that changed. But it started with the ladies of the south decorating the graves of southern soldiers from the Civil War.

In 1868 General John Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR), or the Northern Army as it was also known. issued orders that all graves of all soldiers who perished in the Civil War be decorated. He also set the date on May 30th for this remembrance. The first large scale observance was at Arlington National Cemetery where both Union and Confederate soldiers are buried.

Then it spread over time to remembering all of the deceased members of the military not just Civil War participants. In 1971 Congress made Memorial Day a federal holiday and moved it to the last Monday in May. In 2000 Congress passed the National Moment of Remembrance Act that asks for one minute of silence at 3:00 p.m. local time to remember all those who have died in the line of duty. This moment of silence includes all civil servants not just military personnel.

Now we not only remember the veterans and the civil servants we remember all family members who have passed away. As you go through cemeteries there are markers placed by the VFW veterans of all wars. Many cemeteries have flags flying that were used in interment services that families gave to the cemeteries for keeping and use.

Do you take time to do these acts of remembrance? As I stated at the beginning of this article my family does. Not only do we place flowers and "visit" with family, we also clean headstones and trim the grass around them. We also each year try to tend the grave of someone we don't know but the stones are overgrown and it looks like they have no one to visit them. We take the time to tend the grave and leave some flowers so that someone cares for that person or couple.

You know Jesus cared for not only the living but the deceased before his own resurrection. Did you know that there are multiple stories of his raising people from the dead in the New Testament? There is of course, the story of Lazarus which was very public. But there are at least two more that I remember. These were done fairly privately. They are the temple servant's daughter that he raised to life and the son of a woman in a small village that Jesus and the disciples passed through while on the final journey to Jerusalem. So, I urge you to remember your family during late May and early June. It's not the day that you do this remembrance on it is the fact that you take the time to remember them.

As for activities for United Women in Faith. Our next activity is the Summer Hymn Sing and Ice Cream Social. Mark your calendar for Sunday, July 27th at 6:00 p.m. for Fun Night. We will provide baked goodies to eat along with ice cream and toppings.

JUNE MISSION



Church World Service is an ecumenical organization founded in 1946 to combine their skills, determination and resources to provide food, clothing and medical supplies for Europe and Asia following WWII. They helped to resettle 100,000 refugees in the first 10 years.

They call themselves a "toolbox" that our neighbors in other lands can use to build lives and communities to provide a dignified, safe and healthy environment. They respond to natural disasters in places where support systems are scarce. They provide avenues for clean water to come into communities for the first time helping businesses to thrive. They continue to help settle refugees in the United States. They work with partners from the small communities to the United Nations to welcome, protect and support people on the move worldwide.

They work in every continent except Antarctica to provide a support system for people to grow and manage for themselves. In 2024 they provided 27,275 blankets to people in the midst of natural and man-made disasters; 10,084 emergency cleanup buckets, 11,179 period packs and 30,580 hygiene kits.
